



Coahoma Community College to Celebrate Cultural Awareness Week

CLARKSDALE, Miss. – Coahoma Community College will host its annual Cultural Awareness Week from April 7–13, 2025, celebrating 76 years of history, tradition, and transformation. The weeklong series of events will highlight the college’s legacy, engage students and alumni, and foster community spirit.

Cultural Awareness Events

The schedule includes a variety of programs ranging from academic discussions to campus traditions and community service.

On **April 7**, the series will begin with the Tiger Trailblazer Talk at 10 a.m. in the Georgia Lewis Theatre, where CCC alumni from different decades will share their experiences. At 11:30 a.m., the CCC Birthday Bash will take place at the Zee A. Barron Union, featuring music and birthday cake to commemorate the college’s founding. The day will conclude with Spring Splash at 6:30 p.m. on the Wellness Center lawn, offering water games for students.

April 8 will focus on the college’s legacy, beginning with the Founders Day Convocation at 11 a.m. in Pinnacle. In the evening, students will have the opportunity to attend a Skating Excursion in Cleveland, Mississippi, at 6:30 p.m. Transportation is available for \$1, with sign-ups required at the Student Engagement Office.



On **April 9**, students considering further education can meet with representatives during College Transfer Day at 10 a.m. in the Zee A. Barron Union. At 11 a.m., the Scholars Bowl in the Whiteside Hall Lecture Room will challenge students with a history-themed competition, hosted by Professor Wanda Lee. The day will conclude with the Midnight Breakfast Club at 10 p.m. in the cafeteria, featuring food and entertainment.

The Coronation and Crowning of Mr. and Miss Coahoma Community College will take place on **April 10** at 6:30 p.m. in Pinnacle. This year’s theme, “Crowning Glory: A Roaring Twenties Tiger Celebration,” will be followed by a Royal Ball.

On **April 11**, students and faculty will participate in “Loving on CCC” Campus Service Day, beginning at 10 a.m., working together to improve areas of the campus. The week will conclude on April 13 with the Spring Choir Concert at 6:30 p.m. at Union Grove Missionary Baptist Church, featuring a performance by the CCC Choral Department. Cultural Awareness Week serves as an opportunity for students, faculty, alumni, and the surrounding community to celebrate Coahoma Community College’s history while looking ahead to its future.



Coahoma Students Shine at Statewide FBLA Competition

C Coahoma Community College students earned statewide recognition at the 2025 Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) State Competition, held Feb. 26–28 at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in Biloxi.

Karmese Leflore and Arriyana Holmes represented Coahoma in the categories of Business Communication, Job Interview, and Supply Chain Management. Leflore earned a third-place finish in Business Communication, a notable achievement in the students' first time competing.

The competition included students from both community colleges and universities across Mississippi. In addition to the contests, participants attended workshops focused on leadership, networking, and real-world business insights.

Further highlighting Coahoma's strong presence, Mrs. Kimberly Hollins was named the 2024 Mississippi Outstanding Adviser, recognizing her excellence in mentorship and leadership. The college now turns its focus to the FBLA National Leadership Conference, scheduled for May 31–June 2 in Dallas, Texas, where students will compete on a national stage.

FBLA is the world's largest career and technical student organization, helping over 230,000 members prepare for business careers through academic competitions, leadership development, and networking opportunities. 
